

In a significant event for the SAR 250 celebration, a Liberty Tree was dedicated at the Flag Day Monument in Batavia on June 15, 2024. Sponsored by the Fox Valley Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and the Elias Kent Kane Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), the ceremony featured speeches by Batavia Mayor Jeff Schielke,

This year was the 13th trip for the VetsRoll organization, and included a motorcycle escort the entire trip and back, police escorts on the Interstate through Rockford, Chicago and in D.C., and fireworks with a welcome home

ceremony all the way in from Chicago to Beloit on Wednesday night. Tom and Ray participated in their uniforms in "mail call" one night at a dinner reception, proudly representing SAR.
